EXODUS 20:17

Is It Really That Serious?



- How did **covetousness** find a place in the Ten Commandments on Mount Sinai given by God, right along with murder, adultery, and idolatry? Is covetousness really that destructive?
- And **why** do people covet their neighbour's stuff anyway? Is it jealousy, or lust, or something else?
- If covetousness is truly dangerous, **how** do we live a life without the burden of covetousness?

Why Covetousness is Dangerous?



- Note: the 10th commandment is just one commandment, not 2 separated commandments, as the Catholic church believes
- Covetousness **robs** us from our ability (joy) to **enjoy** the blessings from God. (ill: commercials)
- It also leads us to anxious thoughts (Matt. 6:31-32)
- It pulls us away from God (1 John 2:15-17)
- Moreover, covetousness can lead to other sins...

Why is Covetousness Dangerous?

- Covetousness is the outcome of a **flawed mindset**, created by a <u>false view of God</u> (Luke 12:29-30) and His **blessings** (Eph. 1:3), followed by a <u>wrong conclusion of living in a world of scarcity</u> (Luke 12:13-15), plus a <u>wrong reliance on "stuff" in general</u> (Matt. 6:19-21)
- The sad truth is that many people's **identity** is based upon the "stuff" that they drive, wear, or reside in. Somehow, he or she is "less" as a person compared to their neighbours (Luke 12:15)

I know how to be brought low, and I know how to abound. In any and every circumstance, I have learned the **SECRET** of facing plenty and hunger, abundance and need. (Phil. 4:12)

- The secret there is **contentment** (v.11)—be content with the things that we already have.
- True contentment is a great place to be in: both wealth and poverty will not be our enemies, rather be in a place to enjoy all the blessings that God has given us.

What is Contentment?

- Contentment is a person that has a proper understanding of God's character (Heb. 13:5-6)
- Contentment is a person that has a proper understanding of the true nature of "stuff" (Psalm 102:25-27; James 1:9-10; Luke 12:15)
- Contentment is a person that has a clear understanding of what is worth pursuing (1 Tim. 6:6-10; Matt. 6:32-33) (notice: all about understanding)
- Contentment is thanksgiving (Eph. 5:20; Phil. 4:6-7)

What Contentment is Not

- It is not a matter of **money**—both the rich and poor get discontent. (Prov. 30:7-9)
- It is not a matter of **ambition**—one can desire excellence and still be fully content at the same time (Eccl. 9:10; Col. 3:23) (ill: glass)
- It is not a matter of success (accomplishment)
- It is not a matter of **taste** (class)—a person can know what is "best" and still enjoy what is "good"

Reflection

- Do you often **compare** yourself with others? Do you have a sense of **emptiness** seeing other people's "success"?
- Are you **thankful** with your current circumstances? Do you have enough **faith** to be thankful? (Phil. 4:6-7; 19; Eph. 5:20)
- Phil. 4:11-13; Eph. 1:3) Do you trust that God's blessings are good enough?
- ▶ What are you **pursuing** these days? (Phil. 3:8)
